


RULES OF THE ROAD



The Rules of the Road are required knowledge for any mariner. How we operate at sea speaks volumes to our level of professionalism. In order to accomplish this, a thorough understanding of the Rules is required. Simply memorizing questions and their answers and/or memory aids (i.e. “red over white fishing at night”) will not suffice. The following two steps are the recommended method of study, proven effective by professional mariners.

(Recommend purchasing a personal copy of the Rules of the Road in order to take notes and highlight as you study.)



STEP 1



Re-read the Rules of the Road book (latest edition dated August 2014), available from <http://navcen.uscg.gov>, broken up by the sections listed below. Read each of the below sections, highlight your book (your Ship's Navigator can provide these for you), and do this in a quiet environment to ensure you digest each rule thoroughly.

-Rules 1-3: General

-Rules 4-10: Conduct of vessels in ANY condition of visibility

-Rules 11-18: Conduct of vessels IN SIGHT of one another

-Rule 19: Conduct of vessels in RESTRICTED VISIBILITY

-Rule 20-31: Lights and shapes

-Rule 32-37: Sound and light signals

Do NOT study the following (you will NOT be test on this material):

Western Rivers and Great Lakes Rules

Rule 12: Sailing Vessels

Rule 22: Visibility of Lights

Rule 38: Exemptions
