- 6. I will never forget that I am an American, fighting for freedom, responsible for my actions, and dedicated to the principles which made my country free. I will trust in my God and in the United States of America.

- 1. Take charge of this post and all government property in view.
- 2. Walk my post in a military manner, keeping always on the alert and observing everything that takes place within sight or hearing.
- 3. Report all violations of orders I am instructed to enforce.
- 4. Repeat all calls from any post more distant from the guard house than my own.
- 5. Quit my post only when properly relieve
- 6. Receive, obey, and pass on to the sentry who relieves me all orders from the commanding officer, command duty officer, officer of the deck, and officers and petty officers of the watch only.
- 7. Talk to no one except in the line of duty.
- 8. Give the alarm in case of fire or disorder.
- 9. Call the OOD in any case not covered by instructions.
- 10. Salute all Officers and all colors and standards not cased.
- 11. Be especially watchful at night, and during the time for challenging, challenge all persons on or near my post, and allow no one to pass without proper authority.

GALLEY PROCEDURES

SPEED, VOLUME AND INTENSITY ARE REQUIRED AT ALL TIMES!

These are the basic galley procedures. The Class Team may modify these procedures as needed to accommodate schedule or training requirements.

1. Entering.

- a. Each class/company will have an assigned chow time as annotated in the plan of the day. The Drill Officer will march the company up the sidewalk to the front of Ney Hall under the blue awning (AKA "The Chute") and halt the class at the edge of the step leading to the double door entrance.
- b. The Drill Officer will post on the port side of the formation abreast of the first rank, perform a right face, facing the formation, and commence galley procedures in accordance with the direction of the class team.
- c. The Drill Officer will then give the order, "Guide, post the guidon." The guide responds, "Ayeaye, Sir/Ma'am." Following their response, the guide will proceed with grounding the guidon into the holder and fall back into the rear of the company formation.
- d. The Drill Officer will command "Mess Treasurer, fall out". The mess treasurer will respond, "Aye-aye, Sir/ Ma'am," and the mess treasurer will fall out and report the arrival of the company to the mess attendant and request seating.
- e. The Drill Officer will command, "XXXX Company, prepare to crush starboard. The company will respond, "Aye-aye, Sir/Ma'am." Drill Officer will command "Ready", the class will respond, "Discipline," then the Drill Officer will command, "Move." The company will take one starboard side-step and reply, "Pain," when both heels come together.
- f. The Drill Officer will command "XXXX Company, upon receiving the command of execution 'Move' you will remove your glow belt and stow them in your Starboard pocket." The class will respond, "Aye-aye, Sir/Ma'am," In the same manner, "Ready,"....... "Discipline,"....... "Move"....... Pain.... The company will quickly remove their glow belt and stow it in their starboard pocket.
- g. Once the Mess Treasurer has returned they will center on the company and stand at attention. The Drill Officer will command "Mess Treasurer, Report." The Mess Treasurer will respond "Aye, aye Sir/Ma'am" and make the following report:

"XXXX Company, we will utilize all lines (1, 2, 3, 4) and will be seated at the tables (starboard side/port side) closest to the (goat locker/ active scullery/ inactive scullery/ shark tank" Galley Attendant will direct location). The company will respond, "Aye-aye Sir/Ma'am.

- h. The Drill Officer will command "First four to the door," and the first four will respond, "Ayeaye, Sir/Ma'am," and fall out smartly and open the inner and outer doors to the galley.
- i. The Drill Officer will command, "Column of files from the left, last Sailor sound off last Sailor." The squad leader in that corresponding column will respond, "Forward," The other squad leaders will reply, "Stand Fast" and snap their heads to the left. The Section Leader will command, "March," students will file out in the correct manner, remove their covers, sanitize hands from dispensers on right inside the doors, move into open lines and the last Sailor in the column will sound off, "Last Sailor." The next squad leader will then reply, "Forward March," and smartly lead their column into the galley.
- j. The Company will move swiftly through chow lines and stand at the position of attention when stopped. There will be no talking or looking around. Hold tray with elbows tucked to the side and arms parallel to the deck and proceed to designated tables. (***note: if coffee is authorized, it will be retrieved only after the 15 min warning is given). Each student will get to his/her seat, quickly arrange their trays IAW tray diagram, and then assume the position of attention with knowledge book/sheet held out straight in front of face in right hand, studying.

Note. If student fails to bring knowledge book/sheet with them to chow period, the student will retrieve a table condiment and assume the position of attention with item held out straight in front of face in right hand studying.

Note: If wearing outer garments (coats, jackets), students will remove them and place on the back of their chair before arranging trays). Once each student has assumed the position of attention in front of his/her seat:

- k. The Section Leader (one person per table will be making the following calls and will be sitting in the fwd most inboard to the active scullery: (table 1/2/3 etc, "Put it away table one." Everyone will respond, "Aye-aye sir/ma'am and quickly put study materials inside pocket and resume the perfect position of attention..
- 1. The Section Leader will command, ""(table 1/2/3 etc.) ",, Take..... (Pause)." At the preparatory command "Take" the Table will place their right hand on back of chair (overhanded grip) in unison.
- m. The Section Leader will command, "Seats," At the execution command "Seats," the Table will reply "TO LEAD IS TO SERVE / ALWAYS WATCHED ALWAYS JUDGED / YOUR COMPANY MANTRA" then move smartly into the seats from the port side, sit at attention with heels at a 45-degree angle, back straight, hands flat (knife hands) on each lap not to extend beyond your knees. Table will quickly look port/starboard and align chairs.


- n. The Section Leader will command, "(Table 1/2/3 etc.) ", this is your one-five minute warning." The Table will reply, "Aye-aye Sir/Ma'am." The Table will begin eating, no talking, thousand-yard stare, feet at a 45 degree angle. Elbows off the table, chew with mouth closed. For those that desire coffee or salad bar, it may be retrieved at this time if authorized by class team.
- o. The Section Leader will announce in increments of five minutes, ""(Table 1/2/3 etc.) ... This is your one-zero (10) minute warning/this is your zero-five (05) minute warning!" The company will reply, "Aye-aye Sir/Ma'am," if no food is in their mouth.


NOTE: If done eating early students will sit at the POA, thousand yard stare, feet at a 45 degree angle, hands in knifehands placed on upper thighs.

- p. Once 15 minutes has passed, the Section Leader will announce, ""(Table 1/2/3 etc.) ... This is your immediate warning!" PAUSE...... (The Table will not say anything) no one will get up to retrieve anything after the immediate warning has been given. All students will be done eating, chewing, drinking and quickly place cups on their tray.
- q. The Section Leader will command, ""(**Table 1/2/3 etc.)**, "take, (pause)... feet." The Table will smartly stand up, push chairs in, don outer wear (if applicable), don glow belts, pick-up trays, wipe down their area of the table, and immediately do a left or right face (facing inboard). Students will stand still with elbows tucked to side, arms parallel to the deck, thousand-yard stare and no talking (no one will be chewing, eating, and drinking while standing).
- r. The Section Leader will center on the table facing inboard and command, "Column of files from the left/right (whichever side is closest to the active scullery), last Sailor sound off last Sailor." The squad leader in that corresponding column will respond, "Forward," The other squad leaders will reply, "Stand Fast" and snap their heads to the direction of the squad falling out first. The Section Leader will command, "March," students will file out in the correct manner and smartly place trash (non-food items i.e. napkins, milk cartons, etc.) in trash cans and trays in the scullery. Students will then smartly exit the galley in an organized fashion up the center passage way as directed by the Class Chief.

NOTE: If the Company fails to execute the commands correctly, in unison & with motivation, any student (but especially the Section Leader) should respond with "As you were" – and return to the previous position until directed otherwise.

Ensure your tray is in accordance with the diagrams on page F-4 once you arrive at your seat.
