## **Corry Station Chief Petty Officer Association Participates in Wreaths across America**

PENSACOLA, Fla. – Members of the Corry Station Chief Petty Officer Association (CPOA) and their families participated in Wreaths across America at Barrancas National Cemetery on board Naval Air Station in Pensacola Fla. Dec 13.

The President of the Corry Station CPOA, Senior Chief Intelligence Specialist Jason A. Scott, helped organize participation in the event, where members of the CPOA and their families knelt by the graves to place a wreath; to remember a loved one, a friend, or a veteran who served their nation with honor.

“We are proud and honored to be able to ensure the men and women who served are never forgotten by placing wreaths on the graves of Veterans during the holidays,” said Scott. “Nine wreaths were placed with Medal of Honor recipients and the remaining wreaths were placed with Unknown Sailors. It is especially important during the holidays that the services, our families, and the community come together to pay tribute and honor to these brave men and women.”

The Corry Station CPOA is comprised of chief, senior chief, and master chief petty officers from Navy Information Operations Command (NIOC)

Pensacola, Center for Information Dominance (CID), Center for Information Dominance Unit Corry Station (CIDUCS), and Center for Personal and Professional Development Detachment Corry Station.

More than 7,000 wreaths were placed at Barrancas National Cemetery during the event and according to Wreaths Across America organizers, there were several hundred thousand wreaths placed during similar ceremonies as well – in veteran' cemeteries in all 50 states, ceremonies at sea, and at 24 national cemeteries on foreign soil.

The Center for Information Dominance (CID), based at Corry Station in Pensacola, Fla., is the Navy's learning center that leads, manages and delivers Navy and joint forces training in information operations, information warfare, information technology, cryptology and intelligence.

With nearly 1,300 military, civilian and contracted staff members, CID oversees the development and administration of 226 courses at four commands, two detachments, and 14 learning sites throughout the United States and Japan. CID provides training for approximately 24,000 members of the U.S. Armed Services and allied forces each year.
