



## FY10 PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT TRAINING COURSE “ADVISEMENT”



- **FY10 PDTC Goal**

Today’s chaplains provide advisement to commands in three distinct ways. The chaplain strengthens the chain of command and assists in the development of leadership by providing Essential advice to leaders at all levels. As the principal advisor to the commander for all matters regarding the Command Religious Program (CRP), the chaplain provides Executive level advice. The chaplain also serves to provide External advice to the commander regarding the impact of religious and humanitarian matters on military operations.

The nature of each type of advice drives concomitant liaison work.

This course will provide training to chaplains and Religious Program Specialists in the area of Chaplain Advisement and Liaison, as it relates to the execution of the command’s mission. Using SECNAV Instruction 1730.10 on chaplain advisement as its foundation, the PDTC addresses the purpose, function, limitations, applicability and scope of chaplain advisement and liaison at the tactical, operational and strategic levels. This PDTC will also address the derivative tasks of chaplain advisement to include participation in military operations and in the development of spiritual, moral and ethical maturity of Sailors, Marines, and their families.

- **FY10 PDTC Objectives**

At the completion of the training PDTC attendees will be able to:

- (1) Identify Chaplain Advisement as one of the four chaplain core capabilities.
- (2) Discuss SECNAVINST 1730.10 regarding chaplain advisement.
- (3) Define the chaplain’s purpose and role in advising commanders on issues related to morals, ethics, spiritual well-being, and morale.
- (4) Describe the function, scope and limitations of chaplain advisement in executing the command’s mission, including the management of religious affairs and issues related to the impact of religion on military operations.
- (5) Describe the distinctions of chaplain advisement in its application on the tactical, operational and strategic levels.
- (6) Explain the derivative tasks of chaplain advisement. This shall include tasks related to functioning as a command liaison, key leader engagement protocols, and the education of personnel in moral decision-making, cultural awareness, and



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cross-cultural communications.

(7) Discuss the methods in which a Chaplain delivers advice to the chain of command. This includes direct contact with key leaders and participation in the military decision-making process.

(8) Explain the roles and responsibilities of the Chaplain and RP in advisement and liaison.

### **FY10 PDTC Subject Matter Experts**

### **Important Information**

Funding & Travel: There is "no cost" to local commands for a seat in this training. Funding for travel, lodging, and per diem are the responsibility of the individual participants. Each participant must obtain their own funding to attend. Each participant must also obtain all their necessary travel arrangements.

Schedule: The PDTC will be three days total. The first day of the PDTC begins with check-in at 0700, and will conclude at approximately 1700. A 90-minute lunch/PT break will be provided each day. Days two and three begin at 0730 and



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will also conclude at approximately 1700. Each morning, prior to the commencement of training, the On-Site Training Manager (OSTM) will outline the day's events and promulgate any modifications to the daily schedule. Chaplains and RPs leaving the PDTC on day three should not schedule flights that necessitate leaving the PDTC prior to 1630.

Refreshments: No refreshment mess is to be provided this year.

Faith Group Devotionals: Devotionals are provided by volunteer PDTC attendees for PDTC attendees and they are not intended to create additional duties for local CRPs.

Endorsement of Orders: The PDTC is three days total. Unless otherwise specified, your orders will be endorsed to show your arrival at 0700 day one, and your departure 1700 day three.

Uniforms: The uniform of the day will be the Service Khakis, USMC Charlies, or CG equivalent. The NWUs, MARPAT, or CG ODUs are not authorized for training. Civilian business attire is authorized for non-military personnel.

Blackberry/Cellphones: By direction of NETC, all cell phones, PDAs, Blackberries, etc., brought into the training area will be kept at the rear of the training area. No cell phones, Blackberry devices, or PDA usage will be permitted during the training. No exceptions.

### • **Continuing Education Units**

The Naval Chaplaincy School and Center is an authorized provider of Continuing Education Units (CEUs) through the International Association for Continuing Education and Training (IACET). Participants who complete the course are eligible to receive CEUs if they meet the following requirements:

- Are familiar with course training objectives
- Actively participate in classroom discussion of course material
- Attend all course related activities
- Complete a daily and end-of-course evaluation
- Participate in at least 90% of the course length
- Complete a pre-test and score at least 70% on a post-test



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- Provide a full SSN for the Navy Corporate Enterprise Training Activity Resource System (training will be recorded into one's SMART Transcript).

Partial credit is not available for courses that are not completed according to the standards in the above requirements. Individuals who do not complete requirements for CEUs must reenroll at another site and complete above requirements to receive CEUs.
